Overview

Civic Literacy (10) is a required social studies course for graduation. This course provides students with an opportunity to develop their understanding of how political systems operate, and the context through which they were created. Through the study of civics, students will acquire the skills necessary to become responsible and effective citizens in an interdependent world.

• Link to standards

In the honors level of the course, students should expect a high level of rigor, including taking independent reading notes, and time spent outside class participating in background research used to support in-class case studies and discussions.

Course Description

- In North Carolina the study of history no longer supports memorization of unexamined and isolated facts, but emphasizes the thinking skills to detect trends, analyze movements and events and develop a "sense of history".
- Civic Literacy is designed to be challenging and requires students to take greater responsibility for their learning by participating in problem seeking and solving, scholarly and creative processes, critical analysis and application, reflective thinking, and the expression and defense of ideas generated through the study of content.

Late Work Policy

Due dates are documented via Canvas/Google Classroom and PowerSchool.

Tests will be given on a regular basis per unit, unless otherwise determined by the Professional Learning Team of Civic Literacy teachers. When remediation is offered based on PLT choice, it will be available during the course for a chance to earn credit back on the original test score.
