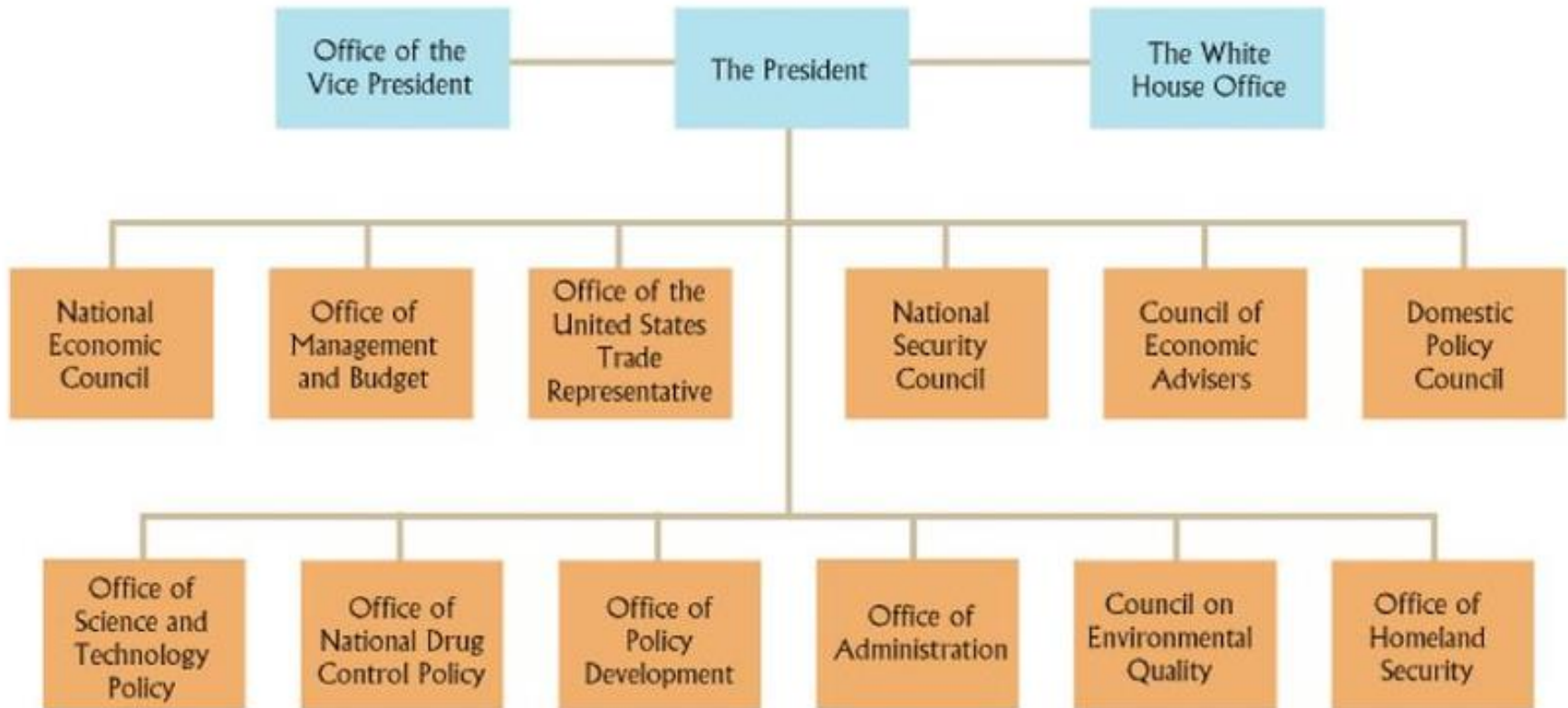

Executive Office of the President (EOP)

- Officials who work the closest to the president
- Created in 1939 to continue to help the president do his job – but changes each administration
- About 1800 people who work within the EOP
- The EOP is in charge of the very large federal bureaucracy



The Biden Administration added Gender Policy Council, Office of Intergovernmental Affairs, Office of Public Engagement (eliminated: Policy Development, Administration, Homeland Security)

White House Office

Work most directly with the president in the White House complex; they are the core of the EOP

-Chief of Staff: works closest to the president and serves as the main advisor; most powerful position of the White House Office →

-Press Secretary: works closely with the media on behalf of the president; issues the administration's reactions to developments around the world



National Security Council

- Small group whose job is to discuss and advise the president on issues of national security
- Members usually include the VP, Secretary of State, Secretary of Defense, Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff and the Joint Chiefs of Staff (top commanders from each of the armed services)
- Also supervises the CIA (Central Intelligence Agency)

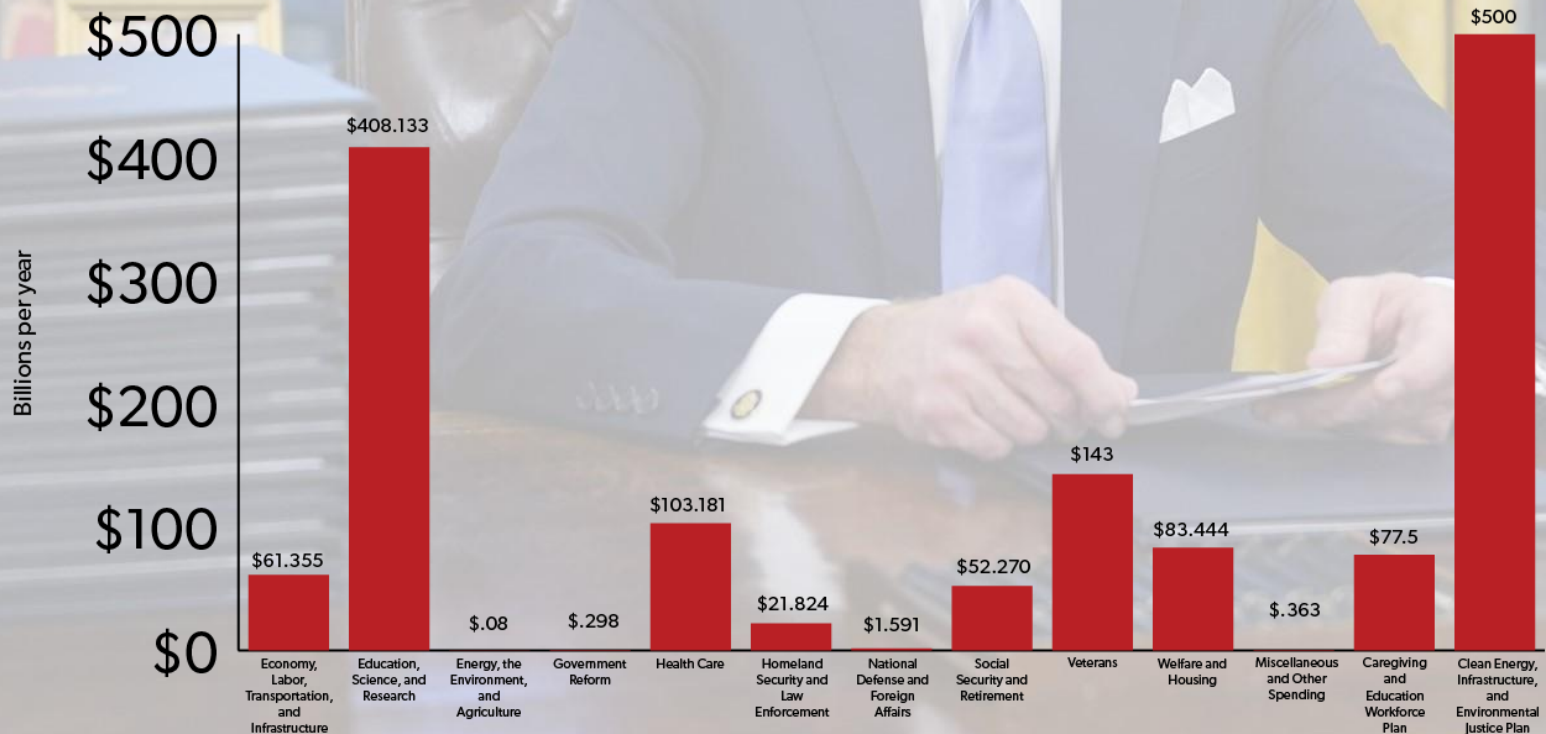
OMB – Office of Management and Budget

- Separate office whose job is to prepare the federal budget and oversee the spending of government agencies
- Prepares the budget according to the goals set forth by the president

The federal budget is the clearest statement of the administration's plans and goals for the coming year

- Budget must then be approved and/or changed by Congress

Other Offices

- Council of Economic Advisers: 3 people who advise the president on economic policy →
- Office of Science and Technology Policy
- Office of Administration: can access records under the Freedom of Information Act (allows members of the public to request records from various federal government agencies; established to make the federal government accountable to the public for its actions and prevents agencies from having secret policies)
- U.S. Trade Representatives
- Policy Development staff
